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ROOSEVELT & THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Theodore Roosevelt was born in New York City—but his heart belonged to nature. So when he became President of the United States, he made it his mission to preserve places like the Badlands forever!



Here are some facts about Teddy Roosevelt you might not have known before:

DID YOU KNOW?



Theodore Roosevelt owned two ranches in what is now North Dakota: the Maltese Cross Ranch about 7 miles south of Medora, and the Elkhorn Ranch about 35 miles north.



He published three books about his ranching and hunting experiences.



His favorite game was one he invented called point to point—fast-paced walks through the woods, cliffs, and streams with one rule: whatever obstacle lie ahead, you must never go around, but always over, under, or through it! (By the way—that’s why our new water park is named Point to Point! It will be open next summer.)



As President, TR established 150 national forests, 51 federal bird reserves, 4 national game preserves, 5 national parks, and 18 national monuments on over 230 million acres of public land.



Roosevelt once said: “I never would have been President if it had not been for my experiences in North Dakota.”



The teddy bear is named after Teddy Roosevelt! Why? Because once, on a hunting trip, his friends cornered a black bear, tied it to a willow tree, and suggested Roosevelt shoot it. But TR refused, because he saw it as unsportsmanlike. A cartoonist heard the story and drew it—and then a candy store owner made a stuffed bear dedicated to TR. The teddy bear was born!
