You dealt with record snow falls, floods and related cleanup, late crop plantings, even snow in June and closer to home in Dickinson – a devastating tornado. Although no records were set, we did grow revenue by .7 percent, and attendance at the Musical was down only 1.9 percent from the previous year, in spite of seven rain-outs and six fewer scheduled shows.

One of the trends that has emerged during the nation's tough economic times is that people are re-discovering the national and state parks. Medora can once again be thankful that Theodore Roosevelt called Medora home for a period of time and that it sits at the entrance to a wonderful national park named in TR's honor. And we are forever grateful that Harold Schafer chose to revitalize this sleeping town. What a tragedy it would have been if Medora had been left to fade into history. Our mission to Preserve, Present and Serve has continued purpose because of TR and Harold Schafer.

What's ahead? The renovated and expanded Rough Riders Hotel with its 76 new rooms, dining room, lobby and registration area, conference



BADLANDS MOTEL – We have had wireless internet and coffee pots in a limited number of rooms. This summer, we will have Wi-Fi in all rooms with coffee pots in almost every room. Last year we updated 32 rooms with pillow top beds, new duvet covers and bed skirts and we will do the same in 32 more rooms this winter. Our Call Center and Group Sales Office will move to the Rough Riders Hotel sometime this spring, with plans underway to find the best use for that space.

BUNKHOUSE MOTEL – Elliot Lindbo and the crew from our maintenance department have been hard at work since closing in September making that popular property even more comfortable. Many rooms will have new beds, dressers, vanities, sinks, curtains, bedding and others will be painted.

Bridging Troubled Waters

This was the year of the "Mighty Little Mo." If I had to sum up the 2009 season in just one word it would be "challenging." I say this because of how things started out and ended; we began with an ice jam in March that left an unbelievable amount of debris to clean up. Then, just when we were about ready to start hitting golf balls in mid-April, the Little Missouri came out of its banks a second time, covering the majority of the course with water for eight days. As it receded, we found that she had left silt and mud everywhere, in some areas up to six inches thick.

Our maintenance staff was very creative in devising the first roller squeegee actually mounted on a track-type skid loader. Without this apparatus, fire hoses, squeegees and the hard work and dedication of our staff and dozens of volunteers and donors, working from sun up to sun down for 25 days straight, we would not have opened by May 15, just in time for the scheduled 2nd annual North Dakota Golf Association's 2-man scramble.

Because of this gargantuan effort, the impact of this extraordinary "100 year flood" event was hardly noticeable as you played the course throughout the summer. A lot of our players could not believe that we had a greatly delayed opening with so little evidence of its proportions. It will go down as the most unusual yet.

Flooding at the course and across the entire state and region, combined with June's cold, rainy weather added up to a slow start and reduced rounds played. But once we got through June, it was like a locomotive taking off and golf rounds continued to ramp up. We had the best September since we have been in operation, yet ended slower in October, like June, due to wet and cooler than normal weather.

In spite of it all, we were less than 500 rounds behind our 2008 golf season. Take away the floods, snow in June, cooler and rainier weather in June and October, and it could have been even more exciting!

The "Burn the Mortgage Campaign" Heats Up!



FUNdraising Highlights 2009

2009 was truly an amazingly successful and FUN year:

- In January 2009, TRMF reached \$25 million in gifts since its founding in 1986.
- Phase 1 of the Rough Rider Hotel renovation and expansion was completed, it opened to rave reviews. Capital funding for this project is currently at \$6.5million and on-going. With continued support, we will raise at least an additional \$850,000 this year to place a firm foundation under this incredible facility.
- Our annual membership grew to over 300 for the first time; we expect to have 500 or more in 2010!
- We were allocated \$500,000 from the state legislature for the Rough Rider Hotel project, along with several other significant public funding supports.

- Celebrated another highly successful Rod Tjaden Memorial Golf Tournament (the fifth) and awarded \$22,000 in scholarships to 19 TRMF summer employees.
