Point to Point Park will open this June, and that means you'll be able to go swimming, ride down a lazy river, and cool off at our splash pad this summer.



To get you in the mood for some magic, Colin shared an incredible trick with us. Watch closely! We're still trying to figure out how he did it... Scan this code to take a look!








# WHAT ARE THE BADLANDS, ANYWAY?

If you've visited Medora, you know the colorful hills and mountains around town are amazing to look at! But how did the Badlands become the Badlands? We asked **Geologist and Badlands Brainiac Kathy Neset** — and she shared some mind-blowing facts:



- Rock layers started piling up in North Dakota 65 million years ago. Some of those rocks are ash from **volcanic eruptions** in the Rocky Mountains!
- When you see red rocks in the Badlands, it means **coal caught fire underground** and baked the rocks above it!
- After all those rocks were laid down, rivers (and very windy days!) started carrying away those huge piles of rocks. That process is called **erosion**. Over thousands of years, erosion caused the Badlands to form!
- Erosion is still happening today. That means the Badlands won't be around forever!
