

Larry Goodall

TOO TANY Badlands Chautauqua Brings Even More Living History To Medora

T orth Dakota and its Wild West past seem so far in the past **LV** that it is hard to imagine present day connections to it. However, for donor Larry Goodall, the connection to Medora's past is just two generations away.

Larry and his wife Dorothy live in Stanley, North Dakota, a short 3 hour drive northeast from Medora. They have been coming to Medora for all their lives. Dorothy grew up in Beach, ND and can remember sitting on the wood planks and logs to watch the Medora Musical. The Goodall's have also been generous supporters of Theodore Roosevelt Medora Foundation (TRMF). Larry's grandfather, John Goodall, worked for the Marquis De Mores. Over the years, a collection of firearms has been passed down as family heirlooms. A Winchester rifle that once belonged to one of the horse thieves that Theodore Roosevelt apprehended during his time in Medora. The other, an 1871 revolver - the story goes that Theodore Roosevelt gave John Goodall the revolver, but Larry stated he was unable to confirm that.

John Goodall worked for the Marquis and his ranch back in the 1880's and was married in the Catholic Church in Medora to his wife Mary. After ranching, the Marquis returned to France and tried his next endeavor of building railroads in Africa and China. He asked John Goodall to wait for him as he wanted him to help him build the railroads, however, due to the Marquis' demise, that dream was cut short. John continued farming and ranching and died in 1931.







Larry and Dorothy said that they would soon have some of John Goodall's items on display at the Cowboy Hall of Fame. Some pictures of those items are included on this page!

Chautauqua, named for a lakeside village **A**in Western New York State where it all began, is a gathering of performers, musical groups, lecturers and audience members who enjoy entertainments, usually beneath a white canvas tent in the summertime. In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, before the advent of movie theaters, radio, and television, traveling bands of Chautaugua entertainers would tour the country to the delight of hundreds of thousands. Many cities have Chautauqua Parks or Chautauqua Streets that date to the heyday of Chautauqua. The 11th Annual Badlands Chautaugua: A Gathering of TRs, always held in Medora over the third weekend in July, has just concluded, and was it a doozy!

Teddy & Edith Roosevelt reprisors came from Minnesota, Missouri, Florida, North Dakota, Montana, New York, and California, to perform and learn from each other and other performers. Adult and child actors from California, Montana, Minnesota, and North Dakota portrayed Roosevelt children Alice, Ethel, Archie, and Quentin. Gary Stamm of Minnesota brought cousin Franklin Delano Roosevelt to

Donna Sewall Davidge of Island Falls, Maine, returned for her second Chautauqua and, at the Heritage Center in Bismarck, added a second performance of "In This Our Home," a onewoman portrayal of her Great Grandmother, Mary Sewall, wife of TR's Elkhorn Ranch foreman William Sewall.

Fargo photographer Kary Janousek lectured on her "wet plate collodiun" photo process and proceeded to make beautiful old-timey photos of our participants.

Singer/songwriter/musician Anthony Rohr of Fargo stole the show with a musical entertainment titled "Tin Pan Alley Teddy" featuring the song book of TR's 1912 Bull Moose campaign.
